#### Colonel's Message:

First off, welcome to our First Sergeants, this position was first presented about 15 years ago and has finally come to realization. Much has changed since then, but the need for this position has certainly grown significantly as well. As with anything new, there will be adjustments in duties and responsibilities as we move forward. We plan to meet with our new First Sergeants on multiple occasions with Regional Command Staff, including at a two-day retreat to discuss with them some successful implementation strategies.

# Virginia Conservation Police (VCP) Introduction and Situational Report



#### VCP Scope of Work

- An accredited Police Agency charged with the enforcement of laws and regulations in the woods and waters within the Commonwealth – Accredited by Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission (VLEPSC) and National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA)
  - Second only to Virginia State Police in the number of sworn officers with statewide jurisdiction and full police powers
  - Primary boating enforcement agency for the Commonwealth
  - Authorized 184 sworn conservation police officers current staffing is 148
  - Twenty-five years ago there were nearly 220 total officers
- Patrol public and private lands to protect our Wildlife and Natural Resources and promote public safety
- At current staffing levels each field officer is responsible for 424 square miles
- o Serves as a force multiplier for federal, state and local law enforcement agencies
- DWR is the largest state landowner second only to VDOT (46 WMAs total of 203,000 acres)
- Responsible for Recreational Boating Safety across the state
  - 53,225 miles of rivers and 116,364 acres of lakes
  - Increasing waterway usage especially by canoes, kayaks and standup paddle boards

#### > Today's Recruitment, Retention and Staffing Challenges

- Like most law enforcement agencies, VCP is struggling to attract, hire and retain qualified candidates
- o 56% of VCP sworn officers in the field have five years or less of experience in this profession
- Due to the complexity of this position, new VCP officers take 3-5 years to be fully capable
- VCP officers are a resource to other law enforcement agencies those agencies often recruit our officers with offers of better compensation and benefits
- VCP officers and Law Enforcement Staff are our greatest resource and our best investment
- DWR is not a General Fund Agency limited on what can be spent directly on Law Enforcement

#### Law Enforcement and Public Safety Funding Needs

- Expand budget for VCP officer compensation and staffing levels by increasing funding from established Watercraft Sales and Use Appropriations & HB 38 Transfers found in §58.1-638(E)
- VCP starting pay <u>not</u> equivalent to Virginia State Police (\$7,788 less / 16% lower)
- VCP officers deserve equivalent pay and benefits to their state police counterparts
- Create Natural Resources Emergency Communications Center / Records Management Section
- Study potential Natural Resources Law Enforcement Training Academy for DWR, DCR & MRC
- Equipment and Training Needs i.e. implement Officer Worn Cameras

- Wildlife Conflict Response Policy
  - This new agency policy has been signed by the Director and is now DWR's standard operating procedure for Wildlife Conflict Response thanks to the collaboration and teamwork of many within the Division and Agency.
- VCP Drone Program Update
  - We are extremely excited to announce that we will be launching our Unmanned Aerial System (Drone) with an effective go live date of September 1st. On that date, we will have two drone systems that are operational. Our four licensed pilots, one per region, will be sharing these two systems until an additional two systems are procured (in the process now). It is our hope that this program will benefit the public and improve our officer safety. While it has taken us a few years to get to this point, we are extremely optimistic that the potential benefits will be a tremendous asset and addition to our toolbox. We have a General Order and an SOP that highlight what our role and function will be. Please take a few minutes to review those documents so that you will be best informed. As with many things, we will learn as we go and will probably have to revise a few things as we grow. Please remember that we will be transparent with our program and we hope we have put in place the necessary safeguards to ensure safe flying practices and protection of individual privacy.
  - Our General Order highlights the possible uses of our unmanned aerial system, which include searching for lost citizens, searching for missing boaters and hunters, aiding and checking for damage and victims after a natural disasters, aiding and checking for damage to property, and providing officers a means of protection during high risk activities, to name a few.
  - In preparation for going live, we will be offering a training session for Visual Observers through PowerDMS. Please look for this training to be available soon.

#### o National Night Out 2022

- We could not be more proud of how each of you that participated in National Night Out represented the Agency and Division! This was somewhat of a last minute push, but you all made it look easy. In total, we staffed booths at <u>33 events</u> across the Commonwealth and got to interact with our citizens and elected officials from state and local government. I know we had the Secretary of Public Safety at one event, and the Lieutenant Governor at a separate event. This was a great opportunity for DWR to showcase what we do to those that know us and those that don't.
- Flippo-Gentry WMA Dedication Ceremony (October 20)
  - Dedication to be held at the Airfield 4-H Conference Center in Wakefield
  - Latest Update: There will be no one from the Allen Flippo family at the dedication - his wife, Mary John Reid, passed away in July (Thanks to all of you, especially the retirees, who gave for her final expenses).
  - The Gentry family will be well represented by 33 family members and friends in attendance. Rich Perry has heard from many of them and this dedication in honor of the fallen Game Wardens means so much to them.
  - OFC Tim Bostic and our DWR Honor Guard will be arriving early to practice at the Airfield 4-H Conference Center. We also expect the VSP Bagpiper and possibly a drummer to take part in this ceremony.
  - The dedication will start at 11:00, the reception will be at 12:00 Noon and the guided tour will start at 1:00 PM. Wildlife Biologists Matt Kline and Emma Belling will be the tour guides. #### Accreditation

- We have completed the first term of the 4 year VLEPSC accreditation cycle.
   After the files are completed we will be inviting a team of assessors to perform a virtual mock assessment on our first term.
- With the command structure changes we will need to revise several of the General Orders. Please remember division members have 10 working days to read and acknowledge receipt of new or revised general orders once published.
- Changes to the use of force and pursuit form will be coming in the next month. These changes will be covered during officer in-service. The intent of the changes is to simplify the form with drop downs, check-boxes etc. to aid in collecting the necessary information and filling out the report narrative. Additionally, the narrative will no longer be duplicated on the forms. The forms will go live sometime after officer in-service.

#### Legal Articles of Interest

Legal Compliance continues to work on a review of Virginia's waterfowl blind law. The goal of the review is to create a document that groups these laws by subject matter to enable law and licensing to gain a better understanding of these laws. This is the first time that DWR has undertaken a comprehensive review of these laws.

#### Permits

#### Law Records

 In association with Community Policing, VSP shared the information below on determining the residency status of college students and military personnel.

Special Note for Temporary Residents of a Jurisdiction:

4-Year College/University Students: If a law enforcement officer determines that the subject is a student of a college/university in the jurisdiction of the stop, Residency should be coded as "Resident" regardless of license address or permanent residence. However, Community College students should be classified based on their current residence (due to the non-residential nature of the college).

Military Personnel: If a law enforcement officer determines that the subject is military stationed in the jurisdiction of the stop, Residency should be coded as "Resident" regardless of license address or permanent residence.

#### **Law Enforcement Operations:**

- UPDATE Operations Major Update
  - Even though we place our primary focus on wildlife resources, there are other resources that require our protection, such as ginseng. It has been proven that the unlawful collection and trade of ginseng goes hand-in-hand with other wildlife violations. Fortunately for our division, Officer First Class Bostic is passionate about the protection of this resource and put together a Game Warden Experience designed to expose other CPO's and federal law enforcement officers to tactics and techniques that can be deployed when working suspected ginseng related poaching cases.
  - Ginseng is a highly valuable / profitable root sought after for centuries by explorers driven by demand and greed to capitalize on the global market. Home to the largest wild population of ginseng, the Appalachian Mountains are highly targeted, often in secret, for 2-5 months out of the year by poachers looking to cash in on "Green Gold"! Though this plant was once in great abundance, it is a threatened species here in the Commonwealth deserving our attention and protection. The Game Warden Experience will be a 2.5-day workshop hosted at Shenandoah National Park HQ, and Rapidan Wildlife Management Area. The training took place in Madison, Rappahannock, and Page Counties. Hopefully, these attendees came away with some additional knowledge, skills and abilities that they can take back to their districts and utilize to make cases. Special thanks to SGT Steve Garvis, who serves as the Game Warden Experience Coordinator for the Division!

#### Grants

• We were notified that we will be receiving a \$289,000 award from the FEMA Port Security Grant that we will apply towards a new 29' SAFE Boat for Region 1. We have been very fortunate the last few years to receive almost three-quarters of a million dollars in federal grant funding, which has allowed us to purchase purpose built law enforcement vessels designed for tidal waters, high-tech marine electronics and host a number of NASBLA courses.


#### Colonel's Message:

After the AFWA Conference, Major Shuler, Major Robinson and I visited the <u>Texas Parks</u> and <u>Wildlife Training Academy</u> and were shown their standards and processes. We plan to incorporate some of their outstanding best practices into our training program.

- Full Implementation of <u>NASBLA Officer Water Survival Course (OWS)</u>
  - The Law Enforcement Division will be implementing the NASBLA Officer Water Survival Course (OWS) into its training portfolio. As CPOs, we work in varied environments, which increases the likelihood that we may end up in the water during our careers. Sudden immersion incidents can manifest themselves in many ways, including falling overboard accidently or in a fight for our lives with a violent subject. As primary responders, we may also see the need to enter the water to rescue a citizen or comrade. This course aims to eliminate the 'shock factor' and provide participants with basic life-saving and water survival skills that will increase the probability of success and survival in our favor should we find ourselves in such a situation. Current CPOs are not required to pass the OWS course but are expected to participate and attempt all portions of the course actively. CPOs who complete the course and successfully pass the three skills assessments (100-yard swim, 5-minute tread, and obstacle course) will receive the NASBLA OWS Certificate of Completion.
  - The OWS Course, designed to prepare an officer for a sudden submersion into the water, was collaboratively developed in 2013. Several state natural resource agencies utilize the course, including Ohio and Texas. DWR has sent five officers through the instructor development course allowing the delivery of the course using our own personnel. The OWS course is physically demanding, with 75% of the course conducted in a pool (normally 4ft-10ft of water depth). Course participants will take part in multiple exercises, including treading water, lap swimming, active aggressor scenarios, and demonstration of self-rescue techniques. The entirety of the in-water portion will be done in full boat uniform: Long Class B pants and boat shorts, uniform shirt, a weighted gun belt, ballistic vest, and shoes/boats. Regarding the perceived challenges our uniform and gear present in water rescue or immersion incidents, the course delivery will illuminate and dispel any misconceptions about those challenges while also providing participants with proven techniques to mitigate those challenges. During most in-water exercises, the participants will wear manually inflatable PFDs allowing the officer to self-rescue at any point. There will also be multiple lifeguards and rescue divers in the water as additional safety measures.
  - The OWS course will be delivered regularly through the end of calendar year 2024. We currently have 1/3 of our current CPO workforce that have already participated in the training. All sworn officers, supervisors and managers are required to attend and participate in one of the sessions offered. The next session will be at the *Prince William County Aquatics* Center, February 6-7, 2023. Registration information will be sent out

soon. There is a class maximum of 20 participants, and the roster will be opened up to our partner agencies as space allows. Additional information on the Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs), Schedule, POCs, Youtube video, Participant Evaluation and other information are here.

  - The implementation of the IAPro system has begun. After completing the initial training and configuration, Captain Comer is working on correcting chain of command assignments and entering awards/commendations into the system. Full implementation of IAPro is scheduled for January 2, 2023 with the BlueTeam rollout to begin in early spring 2023. Policy revisions are also in process to address procedural changes and to ensure consistency within the agency's policy documents.

#### Accreditation

The concept of the North American Wildlife Law Enforcement Accreditation (NAWLEA) was pitched to the Law Enforcement Chiefs from across the County at the AFWA conference in Fort Worth, Texas. The Chiefs in attendance were very interested in the program and lots of positive feedback was received. Only three states (Florida, Washington, and Virginia) currently have law enforcement accreditation. NAWLEA will help wildlife agencies across the county work together to bring increased professionalism and accountability to wildlife law enforcement in North America.

#### UPDATE - Support Services Major

 Hello CPO's, last month we welcomed the permits section to the DWR Law Division. The Law Division continues to grow, and we will soon be welcoming aboard the agency FOIA Compliance Officer. The vacancy announcement for the position was posted last month, and we are hoping to have it filled sometime in November.

#### Communications Center

- Interviews for the communications officer have been completed and recommendations have been submitted to Human Resources for review. We are hoping to have the position filled in the near future.
- There has been a delay in hiring the Communications Manager due to unforeseen circumstances. We are hoping to have the position filled before the end of October.
- Gary Sargent and I attended the User Agency Requirements Committee (UARC) meeting on September 7th at VSP Headquarters. This was to provide a status update on the new Stat Agency Radio System (STARS) that all state agencies will be transitioning to commencing in November starting with the Capital Police. DWR is slated to start its transition in June 2023.
- REMINDER: ALL warrants to be entered into VCIN/NCIC must be faxed to the communications center. Warrants are not to be emailed under any circumstances. The originals are to be either hand delivered or mail (See GO 01-22). If you have any questions or concerns, please don't hesitate to reach out.

#### Legal Articles of Interest

- Recently, the Supreme Court of the United States answered the question of whether an officer is liable under 42 USC § 1983 for interrogating a person who has seized and where the officer did not read this person their Miranda rights. In <a href="Vega v. Tekoh">Vega v. Tekoh</a>, 142 S. Ct. 2095 (2022), the Court held that a person <a href="does not">does not</a> have a right of recovery against an officer under 42 USC § 1983 where the person had been in custody and interrogated where the officer had not read the person his rights. The Court held that appropriate remedy, rather, is to have statements obtained under these circumstances excluded at the criminal trial.
- According to the Court, this case presented the question whether a
  plaintiff may sue a police officer under 42 USC §1983, based on the
  allegedly improper admission of an "un-Mirandized" statement in a
  criminal prosecution. The case arose out of the interrogation of Terence
  Tekoh by Los Angeles County Sheriff's Deputy Carlos Vega. Deputy Vega

questioned Tekoh at his place of employment and did not give him a Miranda warning. Tekoh was prosecuted, and his confession was admitted into evidence, but the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. Tekoh then sued Vega under §1983, and the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit held that the use of Tekoh's un-Mirandized statement provided a valid basis for a §1983 claim against Vega. In response to the Ninth Circuit's ruling, the Court said, "We now reject this extension of our Miranda case law." Vega, 142 S. Ct. at 2099.

- Interestingly, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit recently addressed the issue of determining when someone is in custody for purposes of Miranda. The court explained that the Fifth Amendment requires law enforcement officers to advise a person of their Miranda rights, including the right to remain silent, before interrogating them while they are in custody. In this case, because there was no dispute that park rangers questioned Zabel without advising him of his Miranda rights, the only issue is whether Zabel was in custody when he made incriminating statements.
- In determining whether someone is "in custody" for purposes of Miranda, courts focus on "the objective circumstances of the interrogation" and "how a reasonable person in the position of the individual being questioned would gauge the breadth of his or her freedom of action." The ultimate inquiry is whether, under the totality of the circumstances, the interviewee's freedom of movement was restrained to a degree associated with formal arrest. The Seventh Circuit then went on to lay out its test for making this determination. However, we operate under the jurisdiction of the Fourth Circuit.
- According to the Fourth Circuit, a person is in custody if, under the totality of the circumstances, it appears that there is a "formal arrest or restraint of freedom of movement of the degree associated with a formal arrest." The inquiry also examines "whether, viewed objectively, 'a reasonable man in the suspect's position would have understood his situation' to be one of custody."
- Virginia state courts have a slightly different view. In <u>Stevenson v.</u> <u>Commonwealth</u>, 2020 Va. App. Lexis 288, the Virginia Court of Appeals identified a number of circumstances to be considered when determining whether or not a suspect was in custody, including: (1) the manner in which the individual was summoned by the police; (2) the familiarity or neutrality of the surroundings; (3) the number of officers present; (4) the degree of physical restraint; (5) the duration and character of the

interrogation; and (6) the extent to which the officers' beliefs concerning the potential culpability of the individual being questioned were manifested to the individual. It went on to note that, in evaluating whether an individual is in custody when questioned by the police, no single factor is dispositive. Further, not all of the factors might be relevant in any given case. Rather, the totality of circumstances must be considered.

#### Fleet Management

- Vehicle Update Contact was made with Sheehy Ford on the 19th of September in reference to the 44 vehicles that have been ordered.
- Of the 44 vehicles ordered, VIN numbers were assigned to two of the F150's and four of the Responders. This means that the vehicles are being inspected or in production. The two F150's are being inspected and scheduled to be delivered October 31, 2022. The four Responders are in production.
   Additional details will be shared as they are received.
- Approval has been granted to make the Fleet Manager a full-time position. With the number of vehicles and equipment upgrades on the horizon this position will play a pivotal role in keeping DWR LE Division a float. We are hoping to have the position filled early December.
