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What's New?



A New Look

- This Hunting and Trapping Seasons book has a new layout and a simplified approach to the hunting and trapping regulations and seasons information. In the interest of reducing printing costs and simplifying how the information is presented, the printed version will focus on season dates, giving hunters easy access to be able to know what's in season when. We've also combined the hunting, trapping, and migratory game bird hunting seasons information into one book.

The complete regulations are available on the DWR website and will look the same as they have for many years and contain the full text of the regulations. **It is the responsibility of hunters and trappers to know and abide by all rules stated in the full text of regulations online.**

Turkey

- The fall bag limit has been changed, enabling a hunter to take three (3) turkeys per year in any combination across the fall and spring seasons.
- Only one (1) beardless turkey can be taken within the annual three-bird bag limit during fall seasons.

CWD

- Mandatory CWD testing will take place in Bland, Grayson, Patrick, Shenandoah, Smyth, Tazewell, and Wythe counties on Saturday, November 14, 2026.

License & Camping Fees

- The Board of Wildlife Resources has recommended a proposal to amend license and camping fees. Following evaluation of public input on this proposal, final action regarding license fee changes will occur at the Board's August 20, 2026 meeting, with any approved fee adjustments becoming effective no sooner than October 1, 2026. Please monitor DWR's website for current license fees, opportunities for public comment, and information on potential fee adjustments.

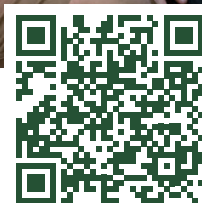

Every person who is required to have a license must carry such license and shall show the license immediately upon request of any officer whose duty it is to enforce the game and inland fish laws, or upon the demand of any owner or lessee, or any employee or representative of such owner or lessee, upon whose land or water such person may be hunting, trapping, or fishing. Any person who is required to carry certain hunting, trapping, or fishing licenses or a hunter education certificate on their person can meet the requirement by carrying an electronic copy of the relevant license or certificate. We recommend the electronic carrying of licenses through the use of our GoOutdoors app. Electronic carry does not require a signature.

Which Licenses Do I Need?

To hunt in Virginia, a resident or nonresident hunting license is required, unless you are license-exempt. Other licenses, permits, or stamps may also be required depending on species hunted and location of hunt. Before purchasing a hunting license or permit, make sure you understand what qualifies as a Virginia residency, that you really need a license or permit based on the exemptions, and you have met the hunter safety requirements.

TO HUNT SMALL GAME

A hunting license is required. A National Forest Permit or State Forest Use Permit may also be required.

TO HUNT DOVE, WOODCOCK, SNIPE, GALLINULES, OR RAILS

A hunting license and HIP authorization are required. Register for HIP online at www.gooutdoorsvirginia.com or call 844-802-4193. A National Forest Permit or State Forest Use Permit may also be required.

TO HUNT BEAR, DEER, OR TURKEY

A bear license and/or a deer/turkey license is required in addition to a hunting license. (These licenses are valid from July 1–June 30 only.) A National Forest Permit, State Forest Use Permit, or Bonus Deer Permits may also be required.

TO HUNT WITH ARCHERY TACKLE

An archery license is required in addition to a hunting license when using archery tackle during a designated archery season for bear, deer, turkey and bobcat. A bear license, deer/turkey license, National Forest Permit, State Forest Use Permit, or Bonus Deer Permits may also be required.

TO HUNT WITH A MUZZLELOADER

A muzzleloading license is required in addition to the hunting license if hunting with a muzzleloading firearm during a designated muzzleloader deer or bear season. A bear license, deer/turkey license, National Forest Permit, State Forest Use Permit, or Bonus Deer Permits may also be required.

If hunting with archery tackle or muzzleloading rifle during any firearms deer season, you do not need an archery or muzzleloading license.

TO TRAP

A trapping license is required. A National Forest Permit or State Forest Use Permit may also be required.

TO HUNT WATERFOWL

A hunting license, Federal Duck Stamp, Virginia Migratory Waterfowl Conservation Stamp and HIP authorization are required. Register for HIP online at www.gooutdoorsvirginia.com or call 844-802-4193. A National Forest Permit or State Forest Use Permit may also be required.

Mandatory Hunter Education

Hunter Education courses provide instruction in hunter safety, principles of conservation, and sportsmanship. There are two options for completing Hunter Education—Classroom with self-study and Full Online Courses.

You must complete an approved hunter education course and carry your card while hunting if either of the following apply:

- You are 12–15 years of age. (You must complete hunter education but you do not have to carry your card if accompanied and properly supervised by a licensed adult.)
- You are at least 16 years of age and you are hunting with your first hunting license.

Virginia accepts and recognizes all states' and countries' hunting licenses and official hunter education credentials for the purpose of complying with mandatory hunter education requirements. These may be in the form of an identification card or certificate.

General Hunting Regulations

Local Firearm Ordinances

The localities listed below have enacted ordinances concerning the use and transport of firearms that hunters must follow. This list is not complete, as some localities may have ordinances not directly related to hunting, primarily pertaining to possession of firearms near parks or schools, hunting or discharging firearms near populated areas, residences, or buildings, and age limitations for possession of loaded firearms on public roads.

Before hunting in a county or city, hunters should become familiar with all ordinances particular to that county or city by contacting the county or city directly. Our local ordinance webpage (see right) contains links to information hunters must follow regarding firearm use in select localities. If a locality is not listed, state firearms restrictions apply.

Permanently disabled hunters possessing a valid hunting license, hunters holding a lifetime disabled hunting license, and hunters holding a lifetime disabled veterans hunting license are exempt from any local ordinance requiring hunting from an elevated platform or tree stand.

Hunters and Trappers Fund Conservation

Hunters and trappers directly fund wildlife management and outdoor recreational opportunities through their purchases of hunting and trapping licenses and permits. In addition, every time you purchase a firearm, ammunition or archery equipment, a portion of the federal excise tax levied on the manufacturer goes to the Federal Assistance in Wildlife Restoration Program (WRP), which is managed by the Office of Conservation Investment under the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS).

USFWS distributes WRP funds to states based on the number of resident licensed hunters, which must be certified each year, and the land area of the state. Under the WRP, the Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources receives funding used to benefit wildlife resources and enhance hunting and trapping opportunities across the state along with hunter education and outreach efforts, Wildlife Management Area habitat work, and recreational shooting opportunities. For a state fish and wildlife agency to receive these grant funds, it must be able to cover a 25 percent matching contribution to projects and activities eligible for WRP funding.

BEAR HUNTING SEASONS

DAILY BAG LIMIT: One per license year, at least 100 pounds live weight or 75 pounds dressed weight (all internal organs removed). Females with cubs may not be harvested. Cubs may be 30-50 lbs by fall. Please observe and be patient before shooting as cubs often lag behind the female.

Dogs May Not Be Used To Hunt Bears In The Following Instances:

- It is unlawful to hunt or kill a bear on Sunday (i) within 200 yards of a place of worship, or any accessory structure thereof, or (ii) with a gun, firearm, or other weapon with the aid or assistance of dogs.
- November 23 - 29 in the counties west of the Blue Ridge and in the counties of Amherst (west of Rt. 29), Bedford, and Nelson (west of Rt. 151).
- November 23 - 27 in Madison and Greene counties.
- When hunting during the archery or muzzleloading bear seasons, except in certain counties during the youth/apprentice bear hunting weekend (see website for details).
- On Cavalier WMA except during the Bear Hound Training Season from August 8 - 22. Dogs may not be used to hunt bears at any other time.
- During the firearms bear season in the counties of Campbell (west of Norfolk Southern Railroad), Carroll (east of the New River), Fairfax, Floyd, Franklin, Grayson (east of the New River), Henry, Loudoun, Montgomery (south of I-81), Patrick, Pittsylvania (west of Norfolk Southern Railroad), Pulaski (south of I-81), Roanoke (south of I-81), and Wythe (southeast of the New River or that part bounded by Rt. 21 on the west, I-81 on the north, the county line on the east, the New River on the southeast and Cripple Creek on the south), and in the city of Lynchburg.
- On the Amelia, C. F. Phelps, Doe Creek, Featherfin, G. Richard Thompson, Mattaponi, Mattaponi Bluffs, Merrimac Farm, Oakley Forest, Flippo-Gentry, Pettigrew, Robert W. Duncan, Tye River, and Ware Creek Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) and other areas posted on WMAs.

Information for Hunters About Black Bears with Mange

Sarcoptic mange is a highly contagious skin disease caused by microscopic mites affecting many wild and domestic mammals. DWR is actively involved in multiple studies to better understand the disease dynamics and impacts to bears in Virginia.

FOR ALL DEER HUNTING SEASONS

Bag Limit

Daily and seasonal bag limits (which vary according to location and are available online) apply across all deer seasons (archery, muzzleloader, and firearms).

Earn-A-Buck (EAB):

The Earn-A-Buck regulation requires hunters in certain areas to harvest at least one antlerless deer before harvesting a second antlered buck (and two before their third buck) in an effort to increase the antlerless harvest total.

EAB on private lands West of the Blue Ridge in the counties of: Augusta, Botetourt, Carroll, Clarke, Craig, Floyd, Frederick, Giles, Grayson, Montgomery, Page, Pulaski, Roanoke, Rockingham (east of Rts. 613 and 731), Shenandoah, Warren, and Wythe. Within a license year and within each individual county listed above, hunters must harvest at least one antlerless deer before taking a second antlered deer on private lands in that county (e.g., before taking a second buck on private land in Wythe, you must take at least one antlerless deer on private land in Wythe).

EAB on private lands East of the Blue Ridge in the counties of: Accomack, Albemarle, Amherst (west of Rt. 29), Bedford, Chesterfield, Culpeper, Fauquier, Franklin, Greene, Hanover, Henrico, James City, Madison, Orange, Prince George, Rappahannock, Spotsylvania, Stafford, and York. Within a license year and within each individual county listed above, hunters must harvest at least one antlerless deer before taking a second antlered deer on private lands in that county. Furthermore, where it is legal to harvest a third antlered deer on private lands, a hunter must take at least 2 antlerless deer before taking a third antlered deer on private lands in that county (e.g., before taking a second buck on private land in Bedford, you must take at least

1 antlerless deer on private land in Bedford; before taking a third buck on private land in Bedford, you must take at least 2 antlerless deer on private land in Bedford).

In Arlington, Fairfax, Loudoun, and Prince William (except on Department of Defense lands) counties, EAB applies to both private and public lands and follows East of the Blue Ridge requirement: must take one antlerless deer before harvesting a second antlered buck (and two before third buck).

EAB in cities and towns: Within a license year and within any city or town except Chesapeake, Suffolk, and Virginia Beach, hunters must take at least one antlerless deer before taking a second antlered deer in that city or town. Furthermore, in those cities and towns east of the Blue Ridge Mountains where it is legal to harvest a third antlered deer, hunters must take at least two antlerless deer before taking a third antlered deer in that city or town.

Antler Point Restrictions

In Alleghany, Bath, Highland, or Rockbridge counties, if a deer hunter kills two antlered bucks in a license year, at least one of the deer must have at least four antler points, one inch or longer, on one side of the antlers.

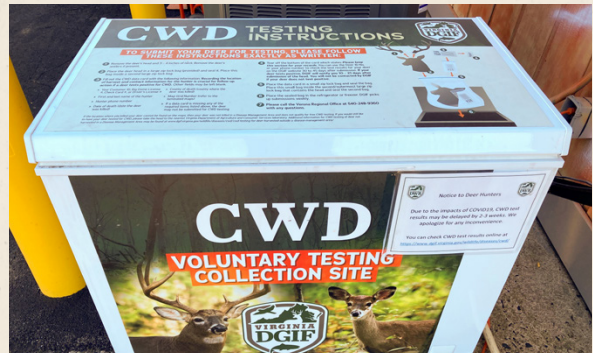
Hunters Can Help Control CWD

Chronic wasting disease (CWD) is an infectious, fatal, neurological disease that affects members of the deer family. The disease is caused by an infectious protein called a prion and is transmitted to uninfected deer directly through saliva, feces, and urine shed by infected animals and indirectly as a result of environmental contamination. It typically takes 12-24 months before CWD-infected animals begin to show visible symptoms of the disease (staggering, lowered head carriage, poor hair coat, emaciation) however, they shed infectious prions throughout the entire incubation period.

The potential impacts of CWD to the white-tailed deer populations of Virginia are a serious concern. Although the disease has not been shown to pose a health risk to humans or domestic animals at this point, eating infected animals is not advised. DWR leads Virginia's CWD surveillance and management efforts and relies on assistance from hunters, taxidermists, processors, other agencies, and diverse constituent groups to implement surveillance and management strategies.

WAYS HUNTERS CAN HELP:

- Prevent artificially concentrating deer at point sources like feeding sites. As such, it is illegal to feed deer in Virginia for any reason year-round in all counties within 25 miles of a known CWD-positive deer.
- When hunting in a CWD Disease Management Area (DMA), consider having your deer tested for CWD. Testing helps DWR monitor the infection rate of the deer populations and map the geographic spread. This information is crucial to helping DWR slow the spread of this disease. Voluntary testing is also available free of charge outside of DMAs at select regional DWR offices.
- Do not transport deer carcass parts from high-risk CWD areas to lower-risk areas. It is illegal to move high-risk carcass parts outside of DMAs. A full description of current carcass transportation regulations can be found at the website below.
- Dispose of unwanted carcass parts in a lined landfill or leave at the site of harvest.

Make Sure You Have Your HIP Registration and Duck Stamps

- All hunters (whether licensed or license-exempt) who plan to hunt migratory game birds including dove, waterfowl, rail, woodcock, snipe, coots, gallinules, or moorhens, must be registered with the Virginia Harvest Information Program (HIP). A new HIP registration is required on July 1 of each year.
- A Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp is required for all persons 16 years and older in order to hunt waterfowl.
- The Virginia Migratory Waterfowl Conservation Stamp is required of all persons 16 years of age and older hunting or taking migratory waterfowl in Virginia.

- Check the weather before leaving.
- Anchor from the bow, never from the stern.
- Dress for the water temperature—guard against hypothermia.
- Wear a life jacket or float coat.
- Properly load your boat.
- Leave the alcohol at home.
- Remain seated and keep weight evenly distributed.
- Stay with your boat if it should capsize.

Quota Hunts

Quota hunts provide hunters opportunities to access public lands that otherwise may be closed to hunting. Hunters can participate in random drawings to hunt waterfowl, white-tailed deer, black bear, quail, rabbits, and turkeys. To participate, hunters must apply pre-season and submit a non-refundable application fee. Applicants should be aware there is no guarantee that you will be selected for the hunt or hunt dates.

Managed Hunts & Workshops

Managed hunts are generally by on-site random drawings or by application through the local Resource Office. Hunting opportunities are provided on various DWR Wildlife Management Areas and National Wildlife Refuges.

DWR has partnered with Loudoun County and Virginia State Parks to sponsor two novice deer hunter workshops and hunts. One will take place at Banshee Reeks Nature Preserve in Loudoun County and the other will be at Widewater State Park in Stafford County. These workshops, for novice hunters age 18 and over, are to educate novice hunters beyond the state required hunter education course and to prepare them for real field experiences.
